OUR FIGHT FOR A NEW TEXAS GOES ON



The counting in key states following the Nov. 3 General Election should serve as an important reminder: Every vote matters.

Now we know that change is coming for our nation after four long years of darkness and division.

To be clear, the election results weren't all that we hoped for in Texas. But the numbers here also tell a powerful story: the youth vote played a major role in making Texas – for the first time in decades – a battleground state at the national level.

The huge turnout helped shrink Republican majorities in the state Senate and the State Board of Education. And Democrats protected their gains from 2018 in other critical state races.

We have always known that changing Texas will take time and a lot of work. So the Texas Freedom Network and Texas Rising remain intensely focused on our long-term strategy stretching back well over a decade now – organizing the fast-growing and rising generation of young, diverse, progressive voters that is clearly the future of this state.

And we are looking for bigger victories in Texas in 2022 and 2024.

TEXAS RISING **POWERS MASSIVE** YOUTH VOTER MOBILIZATION

TFN's organizing program for young Texans, Texas Rising, overcame the challenges of a public health crisis to lead extensive voter registration and get-out-the-vote efforts, and helped propel Texas into battleground state status.



After the COVID-19 pandemic cancelled or curtailed in-person organizing, Texas Rising activists across the state took their efforts online, using digital organizing tools to reach out to millions of young Texans with the information they needed to register and cast their votes, while remaining safe.

The efforts resulted in tens of thousands additional young Texans registering to vote as our state set a new record for registered voters.

As the Nov. 3 General Election approached, Texas Rising also led one of the largest get-outthe-vote operations in Texas focused on mobilizing young voters.

In total, Texas Rising reached out to approximately 2 million young voters, including more than 1 million young voters of color, to get them to the polls. The figures mean that just about every young voter of color in the state with a known cell phone received at least one get-out-the-vote message from Texas Rising by Election Day.



These efforts helped boost overall youth voter turnout and positioned Texas Rising as an organizing force at the Texas Legislature and in coming election years.

AT THE SBOE, A NEW AFRICAN AMERICAN STUDIES COURSE, AND SOME PROGRESS ON SEX ED AND CLIMATE SCIENCE

TFN's year of advocacy at the Texas State Board of Education featured a positive development for ethnic studies and some mixed results on sex education and climate science.

In the first part of the year, the board took the positive step of unanimously voting to adopt an African American Studies course for the state's public schools.

It joined a Mexican American Studies course the board approved in 2018, and made Texas the first state to adopt both.

On sex education, the board took a few postive steps after more than two decades of stubbornly addering to a failed approach. The board in November voted to approve a new set of health curriculum standards, which cover sex education. The standards improved by including information about contraception. But unsurprisingly, the board refused to even acknowledge the existence of LGBTQ people in the standards.

BUILDING

On climate science, in an extraordinary move, the board rushed a new set of standards in only a few months. The board did the bare minimum on addressing the global emergency of climate change, and ignored calls to put the process on pause and get the standards right.

> TFN will be back at the board in 2021 as board members consider next health textbooks and an additional set of climate science curriculum standards.


FOR A MORE JUST TEXAS

Just Texas, the TFN's program that works to elevate the voices of progressive clergy and progressive people of faith, has continued its mission to promote equality and social justice, including reproductive freedom and LGBTQ equality.

In preparation to bring together progressive faith voices to the Capitol in 2021, Just Texas in 2020 welcomed more Reproductive Freedom Congregations – faith communities who support access to reproductive health care services – bringing the total to 25.

2020 was also the year when Just Texas debuted a new podcast, At the Edge of the Lege: Where Abortion, Faith & Politics Collide, adding a progressive voice to the discussions about faith and politics in Texas.

And Just Texas also engaged in the nationwide demand for racial justice following the murder of George Floyd, hosting an online panel discussion that featured members of the faith community and on-the-ground organizers and activists.
